Monthly Report

The Economic Development Department stayed busy during the month of August with the following projects and initiatives:

- Miscellaneous Projects
 - We met with CBM Marketing to finalize our Digital Marketing contract.
 - We met with three restauranteurs regarding the use of our commercial kitchen, as well as the Parks and Rec Dept to determine a path forward regarding the kitchen use.
 - O We met with the Economic Policy Institute of Northern Arizona University to discuss the possibility of them doing an economic impact study relative to the EDA grant for the SR260 sewer line. We also had a separate meeting with the EPI to tour them around Camp Verde and show them the importance of the sewer line.
 - Met with staff at Yavapai College's Verde Valley campus relative to a potential incubator/accelerator project and determined next steps moving forward.
 - Met with ADOT relative to their work on the I-17 bridges and discussed the
 possibility of them utilizing Parson's Park for a staging area in exchange for them
 helping clear that area for a future access road and parking lot.
 - Met with John Haass and Russ Yelton relative to the possibility of partnering on a business accelerator/incubator.
 - We advertised for the Economic Development Specialist position and hope to have the position filled by early October
 - We applied for membership in the Economic Collaborative of Northern Arizona

Trails and Open Spaces

- We worked with Public Works to draft a Statement of Qualifications and coordinate with AAA permitted archaeology firms to secure a contractor for the archaeology monitoring on the Sports Complex.
- We worked with Arizona State Parks and Trails to finalize the requirements for the Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for the Sports Complex.
- o Continued to work on the Verde Valley Trail Fund's non-profit status and set-up.
- We signed the final grant paperwork with Arizona State Parks and Trails relative to the Trail Guide Grant.

Meetings, Trainings, and Community Engagement

- We met with library staff to discuss their STEAM grant and possible sectors/employers that may be good additions for their project.
- Steve presented at Local First Arizona's Rural Policy Forum relative to the Verde Grown project.
- We met with Yavapai County to discuss the broadband project that they have developed and are planning to initiate across the county.
- We met with the Sedona Verde Valley Tourism Council to explore potential grant opportunities regarding the tourism industry.
- Jessica attended an AAED and IEDC training on Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development.
- o We attended the Arizona League of Cities and Towns in Phoenix.

Business Attraction/Retention

- We met with local business owners/representatives to discuss how they might get more involved with the Town and how to enhance their corporate social responsibility with regard to Camp Verde.
- We had a follow-up meeting with the owners of the Valley View property and introduced them to a local restauranteur about the possibility of placing a business in that location.
- We met with several developers to further our efforts in business attraction, but are unable to divulge details due to the confidentiality of these ventures.
- We met with local businesses regarding marketing opportunities and promotional opportunities for their business.
- We signed the final grant paperwork for our USDA Workforce/Internship program and started working on an MOU between the Town of Camp Verde, the City of Sedona, and the City of Cottonwood. This grant project is slated to begin October 1, 2021.

Parks and Recreation:

- August continued to see increases in P&R programs as we move out of the COVID pandemic.
- Yoga and Qi Gong, classes continued with a 10-participant max. Pickleball is back in full swing and very happy to be able to play inside again. Zumba Gold is scheduled to start in September.
- Thanks to a grant written by Angi Grubbs we were awarded a \$6,294 grant to purchase and install 8 park benches around the perimeter loop trail at the Sports Complex. The 8 benches were ordered and the Old Guys are scheduled to install them once they arrive.
- Staff has continued to plan for the fast-approaching 65th annual Ft. Verde Days. The theme for this year will be Desert Life. The Grand Marshals will be Richard and Brenda Hauser. Applications are available for parade applicants. There are already about 50 vendors registered for the event. Staff was also made aware that the Carnival we have used in the past is facing some legal issues that prevents us from being able to use them this year, so we have been working fervently to find another carnival or coming up with a plan B if we cannot secure a carnival for the event. Staff will also be running the Little Britches/Little Petticoats competition this year in conjunction with the Colonel's Daughter contest at Ft. Verde. We have received \$5,000 in sponsorships this year from Yavapai College, SRP, and Larry Green Chevrolet.
- Staff has begun the planning for our annual Trunk or Treat on Main event scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 31 this year. We are looking for donations and sponsors, as well as participants to hand out candy.
- Staff attended a variety of virtual Forums including tournaments, aquatics, and special events through APRA this month to stay up on what is going on with other P&R Departments around the State. All P&R staff is registered to attend the APRA Conference in November.
- Scheduled facility uses this month were as follows: Meeting rooms had 47 uses, Ramadas were at 26 uses, Gym had 43 uses, Sports fields up to 74 uses, kitchen 10 uses, PW Conference room 14.
- The Pool went to an extended at the beginning of the month. The pool was able to remain open for lap swim, Aqua Zumba, and water aerobics on weekday mornings and a few evenings as well. Open swim hours and private pool parties were available on the weekends. Staffing was a bigger problem this summer than in year's past due to the large number of high school students we employed that were unable to work once school started.

- The pool officially closed Sept. 4th for the season. The new heater is scheduled to be installed in the off-season, hopefully in September.
- Staff continues to work with Ron Long on plans for the Sports Complex and purchased 2 medium and one large set of bleachers. Staff attended two different meetings through Arizona State Parks regarding the Heritage Grant funds and will be working on applying for grant funds for additional amenities at the Sports Complex.
- Staff has begun planning for 1st-4th grade Grasshopper basketball. Registration opened August 20th and will run through Oct. 1.
- Our adult softball league began playing games mid-July. We have 10 teams playing this year. The regular season ended and the playoffs began at the beginning of September.
- Parks and Recreation will be partnering with 607 Sports to offer an adult men's basketball league this fall. Games will begin mid-October and will be played on Wed. and Fri. evenings in the Community Center Gym.
- Staff completed the process of moving offices and desks around for the new Parks and Rec office arrangement.

Wastewater Plant:

- Tasked with 59 Blue Stakes for the month.
- Received 12 call outs for plant alarms
- Received 256,268 gallons of septage from septage haulers this month
- Average Effluent flow for this month = 226,485 gallon per day.
- Chlorine contact chambers in place, Installation 98% complete. We have received the Chlorinator and De-Chlorinator. To be installed after we have the canopy to cover these items. Waiting on Design. We are looking into Monitoring Chlorine Break Point to assure it is meet.
- Verde RV Park Lift Station is 100% completed. Working on getting APS for final power. We have approval from APS. Should have Power soon.
- Inspecting the new piping and Manholes at the Verde Ranch Storage, Verde Ranch Phase 1 B, Industrial Drive.
- Continued working on Reclaimed Water Sales Policy.
- Main Street pumps ran for 322.2 Hours, Lift Station #2 = 818 minutes, 57,260 gallons / 30 days = 1,847 gallons per day Average.

Administrative Office of the Courts Director David K. Byers Earns National Award

PHOENIX – Dave Byers, Director of Arizona's Administrative Office of the Courts, received the Kenneth R. Palmer Distinguished Service Award from the Conference of State Court Administrators. The biennial award recognizes a state court administrator who has demonstrated extraordinary leadership and excellence in judicial administration. To be considered, a current or former administrator must significantly advance one or more of the organization's core purposes:



- Developing public trust and confidence in the judicial system
- Supporting access to justice and fairness in the courts
- Contributing to the effective and efficient administration of justice
- Defending the independence of court as a neutral forum for the peaceable resolution of disputes
- Promoting the judiciary as a co-equal, co-reliant, and accountable branch of government.

The award was named after Kenneth R. Palmer who served as Florida's state court administrator. Twenty years ago, Palmer became ill while president-elect of the organization. He successfully

lobbied Dave Byers to begin his term as president early in Palmer's place. Following Palmer's

death later that year, Director Byers recommended the award be established in Palmer's name.

Director Byers was nominated by Arizona Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Brutinel and

Robert J. Torres, former Chief Justice and current Justice of the Supreme Court of Guam. Thirteen

current and former Arizona Supreme Court justices who worked with Director Byers signed on to

the nomination. A simultaneous nomination was submitted by 17 past presidents of the Conference

of State Court Administrators.

On receiving the award, Director Byers stated, "It is an honor to receive this award and even more

meaningful given that the award was created on my recommendation 21 years ago following the

passing of Ken Palmer. Ken was a colleague and good friend. I never envisioned that I would

become a recipient 21 years later."

Director Byers has worked in the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) for more than 40

years, serving as Director for nearly 30 years. He has served with ten chief justices, is the longest-

serving AOC Director in Arizona's 109 years of statehood, and is currently the longest-serving

state court director in the nation.

Arizona Supreme Court Eliminates Peremptory Strikes of Jurors

PHOENIX – The Arizona Supreme Court adopted court rule changes eliminating the practice of exercising peremptory strikes—the removal of potential jurors without cause to believe the juror could not fairly and impartially sit on a jury. Each side in a criminal or civil case has commonly used an allowed number of peremptory strikes to remove jurors who may not favor that side's position. Arizona will become the first state court in the nation to eliminate the practice. The rule changes go into effect on January 1, 2022 and apply to civil and criminal jury trials. The decision comes after more than a year of temporary restrictions on peremptory challenges to jurors put in place during the pandemic, and after significant public comment on the proposal.

Trial and appellate judges, prosecutors, defense counsel, litigation attorneys, supreme court committees, and the public submitted comments on different approaches for rules governing peremptory juror challenges in Arizona's state courts. For decades, federal and state courts have attempted to eliminate unlawful discrimination in the jury selection process on the basis of race, gender, and other improper classifications. The Court's Committee on Diversity, Equality, and Justice and The Task Force on Jury Data Collection, Practices, and Procedures continue to actively consider additional recommendations for improving the jury system in Arizona.

The Arizona Supreme Court's Strategic Agenda calls for maintaining a jury system that promotes participation, fairness, and the oversight to ensure that only impartial jurors are seated on juries. The court considered competing rule proposals to address the problem but was ultimately persuaded that the most effective, fair, and efficient procedure was to completely eliminate peremptory strikes, while focusing on sharpening the process for removing potential jurors for cause, such as conflicts of interest or personal biases that prevent impartiality.

In announcing the change, Chief Justice Robert Brutinel stated, "The Court considered the vigorous debate over the best approach to jury service and trial management. All of the petitions and comments had the goal of improving our justice system, and the Court respects the importance of lawyers choosing the best possible jury to hear their client's case. The Court's rule changes are consistent with Arizona's long history of pioneering jury system improvements, such as allowing jurors to take notes and to ask questions during trial. Eliminating peremptory strikes of jurors will reduce the opportunity for misuse of the jury selection process and will improve jury participation and fairness."

By eliminating peremptory juror strikes, trial judges will need to ensure that litigators have time to develop and make appropriate arguments for removing jurors for cause. The Administrative Office of the Courts will develop training for judges on trial management to successfully implement the changes. Although a small percentage of cases proceed to a jury trial, the superior court in Arizona alone conducts approximately 600 criminal jury trials each year.

Report from Adult Services: Carson applied for a poster exhibit grant through the American Library Association. As a result, Camp Verde Community Library is excited to announce its participation in a 9/11 Memorial & Museum's Education Exhibit: September 11, 2001: The Day That Changed the World. The exhibit presents the history of 9/11, its origins, and its ongoing implications through the personal stories of those who witnessed and survived the attacks. Told across 14 posters, displayed in the library's first-floor exhibit space during the month of September, this exhibition includes archival photographs and images of artifacts from the Museum's permanent collection. It explores the consequences of terrorism on individual lives and communities at the local, national, and international levels, and encourages critical thinking about the legacies of 9/11.

Twenty years after the attacks, with terrorism still a threat today, the events of 9/11 and its aftermath remind us that we may never be able to prevent all the actions of people intent on harming others, but we do have control over how we respond to such events. Whether by volunteering in our local communities, serving our nation in the military, caring for the sick, or through other efforts, all of us can help build the world in which we want to live. As we witness history unfolding in our own time, the ways we choose to respond—both large and small—can demonstrate the best of human nature after even the worst of days.

"During this 20th anniversary year, it is our privilege to share these lessons with a new generation, teach them about the ongoing repercussions of the 9/11 attacks and inspire them with the idea that, even in the darkest of times, we can come together, support one another and find the strength to renew and rebuild," said 9/11 Memorial & Museum President and CEO Alice M. 

Director's Monthly Report August 2021

Our Department's staff changes continue to evolve, with a new Code Enforcement Officer, Anthony Apodaca starting this month. He comes to us with 10 years of experience – we have high hopes to keep our enforcement program moving forward for the community's benefit! Kimberly is starting her training as Plans Examiner and BJ is starting training for Zoning Inspector, both while still assisting with Permit Technician duties. Jon continues to handle building permit inspections, helping with plan reviews, and performing safety inspections. He is also always ready to help out with any other task we throw at him in the office. Roxanne has jumped into her new role as Chief Building Official and has been well received by staff and contractors alike!

We are still in the search and selection mode for Community Development Director, Senior Planner, and two Permit Technicians. We have to have these positions filled within the next several weeks.

The August permits came in at 45 this month. Out of these, there were 11 commercial permits which included new signage, grading for Wee Hollow subdivision, and improvements for the Verde River Bend medical marijuana cultivation site on Industrial Drive. Land Use permits included the Final Plat submittal for Salt Mine Ranches, a Temporary Use Permit for an RV and extension of a TUP for Out of Africa's Glamping site, and 2 Minor Land Division applications. The Director has also been working with BJ with follow up on zoning clearance preparation and inspections, pre-development inspections, addressing/street naming, and land use applications.

New code enforcement requests were 10 for August. Of those, 4 have been closed already, with 2 unfounded and 2 successfully resolved. There are 37 open cases pending resolution and 8 that are in prosecution status. The Director is now working with Anthony on follow up on these issues. He has been given instructions to do proactive enforcement for the vacant parcels in town that have become overgrown due to rainfall. He will notify the property owners first requesting action. Abatement will follow as needed, in order to control potential fire hazards in the near future.




