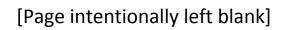

Mayor Dee Jenkins called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

2. Roll Call

Motion made by Vice Mayor Butner to approve the consent agenda with the clerical corrections made to the minutes. Second was made by Councilor LeBeau. **Motion** carried 7-0.

Town Clerk Cindy Pemberton read a letter submitted by Dave apJones, President of the Camp Verde Dark Sky's Community. He stated that the Rodeo Grounds lighting is not Dark Sky's compliant. He is offering to help fix the lighting issues for free. Please contact him.

Mary White is a resident of Camp Verde and is asking for sidewalks to be put in on Verde Lakes Drive. She stated that it is a very busy street and someone is going to get hurt.

6. Discussion, Consideration and Possible Approval to submit an application for State Grants in Aid Construction SGIA-C 2022 Grant Funds of \$50,000 to build the Shelter Canopy for an Automated Library Branch. Staff Resource: Kathy Hellman.

Kathy Hellman stated the library submitted an Intent to Apply for State Grants in Aid Construction (SGIA-C) funds at the end of September and in October we received an invitation to apply for the SGIA Construction Award. Staff is asking permission from the Council to submit an application for SGIA-C Funding Request for 2022 as outlined in the Intent to Apply.

Public Comments:

Susi Thompson asked if this grant is site specific? She is against the site that was mentioned in the Public Meeting.

Bill Decker likes the idea of the library but likes the idea of the sidewalks more. He does not like the site that was mentioned at the Public Meeting. That site is in a flood zone. He suggested Verde Lakes at the Lakes after cleaning it up.

Councilor Whatley asked if there were other sites available. Ms. Hellman said they looked at many sites in Verde Lakes that were owned by the Town. This site seems to be the best location from her point of view. It also seemed to be the safest site.

Ms. Hellman stated the site is not grant specific and can give options. The plans were drawn to be put on any site. She is worried that the State Library will say we are not ready for the grant if we aren't settled on a site.

Town Clerk Cindy Pemberton stated Council can approve the application tonight but cannot discuss site locations.

Councilor Whatley stated this item is only to give permission for the Library to apply for a grant and have matching funds.

Motion by Councilor LeBeau to grant permission to the Library Director to apply for State Grants in Aid Construction 2022 Funds of \$50,000 with a \$50,000 required match to build the shelter canopy for an automated library branch in Verde Lakes Estates. Second was made by Councilor McPhail. **Motion** passes 7-0.

7. Discussion, Consideration and Possible Approval of request for funding from CIP Reserve Funds for projects to include screen and recoat gym floor and stage, repair/replace flooring/ceilings and HVAC in Rooms 204 & 305 and demolish the old Circle K building at the end of Main Street. Staff Resource: Mike Marshall

Mike Marshall (via Zoom) stated staff is looking to recoat the gym floor plus add three Pickle Ball Court linage to the floor, and complete/refinish the stage floor. He reviewed flooring options. Staff would also like to replace the ceiling in Room 305 and add new lighting. Staff would like to put a Mini HVAC System in Room 204 to replace swamp cooler.

Town Manager Russ Martin stated the Old Circle K Building is not in good shape to lease out the building and would like to demolish it.

Motion by Councilor McPhail to approve the request not to exceed \$170,000 from CIP Reserve Funds for gym floors, renovations to rooms 204 & 305 and demolition of the Old Circle K Building. Second was made by Councilor Baker. **Motion** passes 7-0.

8. Discussion, Consideration and Possible Approval to adopt Resolution 2021-1080, a Resolution of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Yavapai County, Arizona, approving an application for Final Plat to develop an 11-lot residential subdivision known as "Salt Mine Ranches" on approximately 10 acres. The proposed project is zoned R1L-35 (Residential Single-Family Limited, 35,000 Square Foot minimum lot size) at 97 Salt Mine Road on APN 404-01-045, in Camp Verde, Yavapai County, Arizona. Staff Resource: John Knight

Community Development Director John Knight gave an overview of the Final Plat. County and Environmental services are doing more research regarding the comment from the County about the code stating they can't have flood irrigation with septic systems. Staff is also waiting for the street name to be approved.

Vice Mayor Butner asked if the applicant knew about the letter from the County. Mr. Knight stated the applicant is here but he will get clarification and bring information back to a future meeting.

Mayor Jenkins stated she called Randy McDonald and told him about the County's comment.

Applicant Brian McDonald said the County stated the code wrong. The Code states that you can't flood irrigate *over the top* of septic systems. They misquoted the

ordinance. They will need to make sure the water is directed away from the septic systems.

Motion by Councilor Baker to approve Resolution 2021-1080 of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Yavapai County, Arizona, approving a Final Plat 20210507 submitted by Randy and Brian McDonald for the purpose of developing an 11-lot subdivision known as "Salt Mine Ranches" on approximately 10 acres. The proposed project is zoned R1L-35 and is located at 97 Salt Mine Road on APN 404-01-045, in Camp Verde, Yavapai County, Arizona. Second was made by Vice Mayor Butner. **Motion** passes 7-0.

9. Discussion, Consideration and Possible Approval to adopt Resolution 2021-1079; a Resolution of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Yavapai County, Arizona, approving the form and authorizing the execution and delivery of a loan agreement with the Water Infrastructure Finance Authority of Arizona from its Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program; delegating the determination of certain matters relating thereto to the Manager and the Finance Director; providing for the transfer of certain moneys and making certain covenants and agreements with respect thereto; authorizing the taking of all other actions necessary to the consummation of the transactions contemplated by such loan agreement and this resolution and declaring an emergency. Staff Resource: Russ Martin.

Town Manager Russ Martin stated this is the final step in the WIFA process. This is for a 25-year loan at 2% or less (currently it is 1.8%). The rate can only be locked in 3 days prior to closing and we are currently anticipating closing mid-December. Mr. Martin reviewed the due diligence background on this item.

Motion by Councilor Murdock to approve and adopt Resolution 2021-1079 a resolution of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde Arizona as presented in the agenda item. Second was made by Vice Mayor Butner. **Motion** passes 7-0.





RESOLUTION 2012-874

A RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COMMON COUNCIL
OF THE TOWN OF CAMP VERDE, YAVAPAI COUNTY, ARIZONA,
DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO DESIGNATE A DEFINED AREA AROUND THE
DOWNTOWN AS AN ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT PURSUANT TO A.R.S. §4-207
THEREBY ALLOWING THE TOWN OF CAMP VERDE TO APPROVE ON A CASE-BY-CASE
BASIS EXEMPTIONS FROM THE DISTANCE RESTRICTIONS PRESCRIBED THEREIN
FOR THE ISSUANCE OF CERTAIN LIQUOR LICENSES FOR ESTABLISHMENTS IN
RELATION TO PUBLIC, PRIVATE, OR CHARTER SCHOOLS OR PLACES OF WORSHIP.

WHEREAS, on April 2010, the State Legislature passed House Bill 2596, amending sections 4-207 and 41-1493, Arizona Revised Statues; amending Title 41, Chapter 9, Article 9, Arizona Revised Statutes; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. §4-207 restricts the granting of certain types of liquor license to establishments within 300 feet of existing schools and places of worship; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. §4-207 allows the governing body of a city or town to grant an exemption from these distance restrictions, on a case-by-case basis for an establishment located in an area that is designated as an Entertainment District; and

WHEREAS, A.R.S. §4-207 declares that for the purposes of that section, "Entertainment District" means a specific contiguous area that is designated an entertainment district by a resolution adopted by the governing body of a city or town, that consists of no more than one square mile, that is no less than one-eighth of a mile in width and that contains a significant number of entertainment, artistic and cultural venues, including music halls, concert facilities, theaters, arenas, stadiums, museums, studios, galleries, restaurants, bars and other related facilities; and

WHEREAS, the area proposed as the Entertainment District/Arts and Entertainment District/Heritage District or other description, meets the above description of an Entertainment District for the purposes of A.R.S. §4-207; and

WHEREAS, the authority for the Town Council to grant such exemptions from distance requirements for establishments requiring certain liquor licenses in the Entertainment District would support the location of desirable and activating uses in this area.

WHEREAS, the Town has identified criteria to aid in the consideration and deliberation of exemptions hereto and to promote the general health, safety and welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Arizona as follows:

SECTION 1: Entertainment District

1. The Town Council of the Town of Camp Verde does herby accept and adopt the Entertainment District as shown in Exhibit A.

SECTION 2: Separability

In the event any part, portion or paragraph of this Resolution is found to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of such part, portion, or paragraph shall not affect any other valid part, portion, or paragraph of this Resolution and effectiveness thereof;

SECTION 3: This Resolution shall become effective in the manner provided by law.

EASTERN RURAL AZ REDISTRICTING BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The following is a brief history and informational explanation of the 5+ Eastern Counties Legislative District Proposal:

US CONSTITUTIONAL MANDATE.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States... The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. – Article 1, Section 2, US Constitution.

Every Ten years since 1790, two events occur in every state in America. 1) Enumeration. 2) Apportionment. This translates into the decennial census in years ending in "0", followed by redistricting in years ending in "1".



ROLE OF STATE OF ARIZONA

The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof... Article 1, Section 4, US Constitution.


Presumably from statehood until the year 2000, Congressional and Legislative Redistricting was performed by the AZ State Legislature. Utilizing the ballot initiative process, the voters of

Arizona were convinced in the November election of 2000 to approve a measure creating a body entitled the **Arizona Independent Redistricting commission**.


Applicants from across the state would be invited to apply. No one having served in office, run for office, including precinct committeeman, been an officer in a campaign, except for school board, within the previous three years would be eligible to serve on the newly created commission. The applicant pool is then reviewed and 25 finalists are chosen by the Arizona Commission on Appellate Court Appointments: 10 Republicans, 10 Democrats, and 5 Independents/Other. One from the first two pools are selected by the minority party and majority party of each house of the legislature. At last, those four chosen then choose an Independent/Other from the pool of five selectees. Those five are seated as the Redistricting Commission (AZIRC) for the next ten years.

2001-2010 LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT: 5 RURAL EASTERN COUNTIES.



The map above in the area marked "5" is the original Eastern Rural Legislative District developed by the Redistricting Commission. It was composed of all or part of the 5 eastern counties: Gila, Graham, Greenlee, Navajo, and Apache. The later two were truncated at the Navajo Reservation line. Hayden and Winkelman of the southern tip of Gila County were placed into greater Pinal County (LD 23 at the time). The San Carlos Apache and White Mountain Apache Nations were included with the five eastern counties.


2011 LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT PROPOSAL: KEEP RURAL AZ UNITED



During the 2011 redistricting, concerned citizens in Eastern AZ with the support of Sen. Allen, Rep. Barton, and Rep. Crandell, the Legislative delegation of the time, began a grassroots effort to advocate keeping our rural district largely unchanged. Due to population increase in the state, but unchanged or loss of population in the rural areas, we had to include additional population areas. With the intent of abiding by the objective of uniting rural communities with natural resource culture and economies, we proposed adding the Copper Corridor communities of Superior, Kearney, Hayden, and Winkelman, as well as the Verde Valley, largely composed of Camp Verde.

15 cities and towns across the proposed region adopted resolutions in support of it. These included: Miami, Globe, Pima, Duncan, Hayden, Winkelman, Superior, Show Low, Pinetop-Lakeside, Snowflake, Winslow, Eagar, Springerville, St. Johns, and Camp Verde. If we had more time, no doubt more governments could have joined the movement.

2011-2020 LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS: RURAL EASTERN AZ SPLINTERED AMONG URBAN CENTERS



Despite our efforts, our appeal was dismissed by the previous Commission. The result was an incomprehensible scribbling, disregarding one of the fundamental requirements for district mapping, following a grid pattern. Graham and Greenlee were placed with Sierra Vista and eastern Tucson outskirts; southern Gila was placed with Casa Grand and Santan; northern Gila and central Navajo were joined to Flagstaff; southern Apache and Navajo counties were used as a land bridge to create a majority American Indian district, joining the White Mountain and San Carlos Apache Nations with the previous decade's district that combined the Navajo, Hopi, and Yavapai Apache reservations.

ARIZONA CONSTITUTIONAL REDISTRICTING REQUIREMENTS

In addition to the federal constitution and congressional legislation, particular the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Arizona Constitution lays down certain requirements for the AZIRC to follow. These are:

- 1. Districts shall have equal population to the extent practicable
- 2. Districts shall be geographically compact and contiguous to the extent practicable

- 3. District boundaries shall respect communities of interest to the extent practicable
- 4. To the extent practicable, district lines shall use visible geographic features, city, town and county boundaries, and undivided census tracts
- 5. To the extent practicable, competitive districts should be favored where to do so would create no significant detriment to the other goals
- 6. Party registration and voting history data shall be excluded from the initial phase of the mapping process but may be used to test maps for compliance with the above goals. The places of residence of incumbents or candidates shall not be identified or considered.
 - -Arizona Constitution, Article 4, Part 2, Section 1, paragraphs 14-15

For Rural Arizona, nothing is truer than Communities of Interest. Above partisan politics, our rural way of life and the unique challenges that brings, our communities share a common identity. From the forests of the White Mountains to the farms of the Gila Valley, from Morenci Mine to the Ray Mine, from the Verde River to the Gila River, whether you're standing on a corner in Winslow Arizona, or you stop for coffee in downtown Globe on a *Midnight Run*, our communities share an identity dating back to the 1870s and before.


2021 LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT PROPOSAL: 5+ EASTERN COUNTIES

The map below reflects the baseline proposal of the 5+ Eastern Counties district. The target population this decade is approximately 238,000. A variance of five percent above or below this number is permitted. The Commission has signaled that they will keep all of the American Indian Reservations united in one legislative district. Therefore, our proposal reflects a united Rural Eastern AZ built around that eventuality.

The map includes the 5 Eastern Counties as rendered in 2001: Gila, Graham, Greenlee, southern Navajo and Apache. Additionally, it proposes adding the communities of the Copper Corridor, namely, Superior, Kearny, Hayden, Winkelman, Dudleyville, Mammoth, San Manuel, and Oracle with surrounding areas west to Hwy 79 (but excluding Florence); and the Verde Valley in the north, principally Camp Verde and Rim Rock, with surrounding areas, excluding the San Carlos and White Mountain Apache Nations.

However, rather than subjugating any non-reservation communities to a district that shares virtually no common interest, it is proposed to connect the reservations with a more or less uninhabited area of land crossing northeastern Gila County and Southwestern Navajo County. The Coconino County community of Flagstaff is more suitably combined with the American Indian Nations than any rural community of Eastern Arizona. Northern Cochise County could be joined to supplement the loss of the Reservation population, including Willcox and Benson, but excluding Tombstone and St. David.

LISTENING TOUR, PUBLIC HEARINGS, ACCELERATED PROCESS

In their July-August tour, the IRC held five public hearings across Eastern AZ in person or by remote location. They have begun their final public hearing tour and will have only three.

- 1. Satellite location San Carlos Tribal Council Chambers, Wednesday, November 17
- 2. Satellite location Pinetop-Lakeside, Hon-Dah Casino Conference Center, 777 AZ-260, Pinetop, AZ 85935, Tuesday, November 30, 6 p.m.
- 3. Onsite location Payson, Mazatzal Casino Event Center, Highway 87, Mile Marker 251, Payson, AZ 85541, Wednesday, December 1, 6 p.m.

Upon the end of this draft map tour, the IRC will produce and publish their final maps. We have until December 4, 2021, to submit all public input.

During the first tour, myself, Jesse Bryant, Senator Sylvia Allen (ret.), and numerous concerned citizens from around our region attended these hearings as they occurred in our region, and addressed how critical restoring our rural district is to our citizens. I personally attended and spoke at four hearings. The concept was repeated to the Commissioners several times. In the cases where citizens spoke, the message of a rural regional district was repeated.

Since then, myself, Senator Allen, and various volunteers, have appeared before town councils, association meetings, and other events to educate and rally support for this critical measure.






Scenario – A: Eastern AZ United




Scenario – B: Reservations Combined











5 East Counties: Graham, Greenlee, Gila, southern Navajo and Apache.

Copper Corridor: Eastern rural Pinal, Hwy 177/77 to Hwy 79 (Superior to Oracle)

Verde Valley: Southeastern corner of Yavapai, east of I-17 (Camp Verde and Rim Rock)

Northern Cochise: Willcox, Benson, Kansas Settlement, Sunsites, and Portal

Dear Messers. Shipley and Bryant and Ms. Cassillas:

On behalf of the nearly 17,000 members of the San Carlos Apache Tribe ("Tribe"), thank you for your proposal for a legislative district map to either (1) unify five eastern counties similar to the district maps from 2001 including the Apache Tribes, or (2) to unify the Apache Tribes with tribes in Northern and Northeastern Arizona excluding uninhabited lands in Gila County and Southwestern Navajo County.

At this time, the Tribe would oppose your first proposal. This redrawn map will separate the existing community of interest among the seven (7) tribes and their homelands that are geographically located within the current Legislative District 7 (LD-7): Hualapai, Havasupai, Navajo Nation, Hopi Tribe, San Juan Southern Paiute, and the White Mountain Apache Tribe. Each tribe continues to constitute one population of a distinct minority group with extensive social, historical and cultural bonds which contribute to the strong community of interest among their tribal members. Each tribe is a sovereign Indian nation with legislative jurisdiction over

their reservations. Each tribe speaks their own language, enjoy a unique Indian culture and history and constitute a separate political subdivision in Arizona. Each tribe has its own organic governing documents and government, its own police authority, health department, utility services and the tribes exercise governmental taxing authority. Each reservation is a unified minority community of interests of tribal members and residents. Collectively, each tribe shares a common history and legacy within Arizona.

Next, the Tribe cautiously supports your second proposal. For the same reasons stated above, the Tribe wants to ensure that it remains within the current community of interest shared among tribes and its tribal members who live off-reservation in nearby cities and towns. While your second proposal offers this consistency, we cannot support the dilution of the Native American vote by excluding Navajos and Apaches who reside on nearby bordertowns, such as those cities and towns along Interstate 40, ShowLow, Pinetop, Springerville, etc.

Your second proposal has the potential to exclude these areas with significant Native American populations that share a community of interest with their neighboring reservation homelands. The current Test Map Version 10.0 was officially adopted on October 28, 2021, as the official Legislative Draft Map appears to address our concerns, so the Tribe will continue to support such an approach. The newly adopted Test Map 10.0 is available at https://redistricting-irc-az.hub.arcgis.com/pages/draft-maps#approveddraftmaps.

While I understand the Commission's effort to establish parity among the districts by equally dividing the population among 30 Legislative Districts and 9 Congressional Districts, it would be reasonable to keep the San Carlos Apache Reservation within LD 7 and CD 1 based on the negligible change in population among the counties that comprise these districts. These counties include Mohave, Coconino, Navajo, Apache, Gila, Graham, Pinal, and Greenlee. There was an 10% to 19.9% increase in population for Greenlee and Pinal. Coconino and Mohave Counties realized a 5% to 9.9% increase in population. Graham realized a 0% to 4.9% increase in population. Gila, Navajo, and Apache Counties increases were less than 0%. This information is available at https://www.census.gov/library/visualizations/2021/dec/percent-change-county-population.html.

In closing, I appreciate your efforts to solicit input from the Tribe concerning your proposals. I renew our call to maintain the status quo on Congressional and Legislative Maps that the Commission adopted January 17, 2012 based on the neglible increase in the statewide population, which was not sufficient to warrant another district, so any proposed redistricting is not necessary especially when combined with negligible population increases in LD 7 and CD 1.

As we say in our Apache language, Ahi'yi'é (thank you) for consideration in scheduling a Grid Map Public Hearing Session on the San Carlos Apache Reservation. It is my hope that

Dear IRC Commissioners,

I am a Yavapai County Supervisor and wish to respond to the latest draft of the Legislative District map released by your commission on October 28th. I feel that Yavapai County has been correctly depicted as basically being its own LD which is appropriate based on our population numbers and communities of interest. Additionally, I would ask that this LD not be changed in the final commission map except for adding into LD-5 the small portion of the Town of Sedona that resides in Coconino County so as not to split the town into 2 LDs.

I have been told by various elected officials and others in the Verde Valley that there is a concerted effort by the Coconino County Supervisors to submit a map for consideration in the final LD mapping phase that includes the entire Verde Valley area of Yavapai County in LD-7. I find this action by the Coconino Board of Supervisors (BOS) to be highly partisan and frankly an irresponsible power grab. Their attempt to create a very partisan district that favors Democrats violates the sovereign jurisdiction of Yavapai County and is likely designed to interfere with the governing efforts of the Yavapai County Board of Supervisors. In addition, such an arrangement would break the communities of interest in Yavapai County. Examples include: our Western heritage and culture, rural and ranching business interests, and the critical issues regarding water policy, to name a few. So, I ask the commission to resist this attempt by the Coconino BOS to meddle in the governing affairs of Yavapai County. Keeping Yavapai as its own LD will allow the Yavapai BOS to ensure effective policy and services throughout the county.

It makes no sense to redraw the entire Verde Valley and all its voters with Coconino County. This action would effectively realign approximately one-third of Yavapai County with Coconino. In my view it would be more appropriate to align the very small area of the Town of Sedona in Coconino County with Yavapai County so as not to divide the town across two LDs. This is a more reasonable approach with very little impact to residents vs a 1/3 population realignment as proposed by the Coconino BOS and others.

The Yavapai BOS is committed to eliminating the perceived schism between the Verde Valley and the rest of the county that has developed over time, and the current draft map of keeping Yavapai County whole will go a long way to supporting that effort.

After much research, deliberation and consideration of the goals and requirements of Proposition 106, the Coconino County Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a revised Legislative District map at their October 26 meeting. We submit that map today for your serious consideration.

Lena Fowler District 5

The map is of LDs 6 and 7. It includes the values which we have articulated to the AIRC for the past several months, meeting the constitutional mandates of competitiveness, communities of interest, equal population, geographical compactness, and keeping cities whole. Competitiveness is a significant issue and is reflected in the map. Our data shows that the district numbered as LD6 is one of the most competitive Legislative Districts, if not the most competitive district, in the state. The breakdown is as follows: deviation is -6.33%. 49.82% Democrat, 50.18% Republican.

Further, the District numbered as LD7 meets the goals of Native American communities to have a minority/majority legislative district. Outline data here: Deviation is -6.73%. Using the standard VAP, the LD7 VAP of Native Americans is 57.97%. which would allow Native American voters to elect a candidate of choice.

These maps reflect the many comments that were submitted in writing and stated in person to the AIRC over the past months of AIRC Listening Tours, and specifically those held in the Cities of Flagstaff and Sedona. Those statements again and again contained comments of the northern Arizona voters advocating to:

- 1. Keep cities whole, specifically the City of Flagstaff and the City of Sedona.
- 2. Keep communities of interest whole specifically in relationship to our workforce, watershed, natural resources, and ranching communities; to adhere to the requirement of Proposition 106 to establish competitive districts to the largest extent possible.
- 3. Keep the Verde Valley communities whole as a community of interest, and with Flagstaff, which is reflective of the majority of testimony for this area.
- 4. Allow for Native American and Hispanic communities to elect candidates of their choice while respecting the voting age population they have held in the past,

establishing a minority/majority district reflective of the large American Indian population in northern Arizona.

The maps we submit to you today meet all of those sentiments from most Northern Arizona citizens who commented.

On the contrary, the AIRC LD8.0 map does not reflect the comments made to the AIRC in Northern Arizona as described above. First and foremost, the three Legislative Districts of most importance to Coconino County (described in the 8.0 map as LD 5, 6, and 7) are each very uncompetitive, depriving voters in those areas of the ability to elect a candidate of their choice for the next ten years:

- 1. District 5: R-64.23%, D-35.77%.
- 2. District 6: R-28.78%; D-71.22%.
- 3. District 7: R65.18%, D:34.83, a 30-point margin.

In addition, major cities in this area are not being kept whole in the IRC 8.0 map.

Therefore, Madam Chair, Mr. Vice Chair and Commissioners, we ask that you earnestly consider a revision to the northern Arizona portion of the 8.0 map in your deliberations at the October 28 meeting of the AIRC. We understand that time is of the essence for your work. We also understand that you have strived diligently to have the maps reflect the many public comments you have received over the past several months. It is our sincere hope that you will take the necessary time to include our maps in order to properly reflect the constitutional requirements of Proposition 106.

To Arizona Redistricting Chair and Committee Members:

The Town of Camp Verde and the City of Sedona both presented testimony at the Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC) Hearing on July 27, 2021. In that testimony, the City of Sedona requested it be kept intact in both a Congressional District and a Legislative District and specifically asked first and foremost that the City be kept intact and not be split by County lines. The both us and the City of Sedona also requested an outcome that maintains the Verde Valley communities consisting of Sedona, Village of Oak Creek, Cottonwood, Camp Verde, Jerome, and Clarkdale, as well as the Yavapai Apache Nation, together within congressional and legislative districts.

The IRC has now released Draft District Grid maps. The preliminary Congressional District Grid Map represents the City of Sedona intact in what would become Congressional District 2. It also maintains the relationships that Sedona has with its neighboring communities, with which it shares business and economic interests, residential housing opportunities, health care providers/facilities, transportation corridors and infrastructure, cultural and educational institutions, and many other long-term alliances, as well as our shared history, natural resources, and physical features.

However, the preliminary Legislative District Grid Map represents the City of Sedona as split between two legislative districts, which removes a portion of Sedona and its residents from the relationships and bonds listed above. The Town of Camp Verde supports the City of Sedona's request for reconsideration of the proposed Legislative District boundaries. The Town of Camp Verde supports the City of Sedona's request be kept intact to ensure their residents can continue to speak with one voice as a community.

We further ask that Sedona be kept with its neighboring communities so that our region may have unified representation in matters before the state. We request respect for our communities of interest and geographic area. We seek an outcome that recognizes the importance of aligning Sedona with us and our neighboring communities that have similar common interests. Representation and community voice are ideals at the heart of independent redistricting. We appreciate the Independent Redistricting Commission's consideration of our Camp Verde Town Council's unanimous support for this request.
