Mayor German called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

#### 2. Roll Call

Mayor Charles German, Vice Mayor Jessie Murdock, Councilor Dee Jenkins, Councilor Brad Gordon, Councilor Jackie Baker and Councilor Buck Buchanan were present. Councilor Robin Whatley was absent.

Mayor German recused himself on Item 4c because he is under litigation. Vice Mayor Murdock pulling item 4C, from the Consent Agenda, and made a **Motion** to approve the Consent Agenda with the corrections of (4b) Friday, April 20, 2018 (corrected from typo 3018) and cancellation of March 28, 2018 Council hears P&Z Matters, replacing with Wednesday, March 28, 2018 5:30 p.m.- Executive Session. Second was made by Councilor Baker. **Motion** carried unanimously.

**Motion** made by Vice Mayor Murdock to award Agreement #18-125, in the amount of \$2,067,863 to Earth Resources Corporation, for the construction of Phase I Camp Verde Sports Complex, drainage and infrastructure improvements. Second was made by Councilor Baker. Councilor Gordon asked what interest rate was locked in for the loan of the property. Town Manager Russ Martin stated it is 3.3%. Mayor German commended Public Works Director Ron Long on the memorandum. **Motion** carried with Mayor German abstaining.

  - **7.1. Public Hearing on proposed Wastewater Rate Increase.** [Staff Resource: Michael Showers, Troy Odell]
    - 7.1.1. Staff Report- Town Manager Russ Martin stated that during Town Council discussions about projects, staff presented these projects for consideration. These projects will put the Plant in an efficient state for anticipated growth and will fulfill the original intent of the design through doubling our current daily usage. This has required redesign of some aspects of the plan, and when complete should eliminate occasional effluent violations that are placed (safely) into lined ponds.

The projects included have been funded for a loan in February from WIFA. This includes a \$1,000,000 principal forgiveness (grant) to complete these projects. This, along with the previous completion of WIFA funds currently under construction, will position the Plant for operational needs for a decade or better,

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with limited maintenance upgrades currently in this project.

Fees will be increasing approximately \$5 per month. Residents will see a rate change in May 2018 and then again in January 2019. Mr. Martin stated the only rates currently less than Camp Verde's proposed rate change is Cottonwood. Future rate studies will include a flow component to more accurately calculate the resident impact. Until flow information is collected, this is impossible to do.

Mr. Martin also stated it is important to note that some may see even more of an increase if they currently have more than average fixture counts (generally in larger homes) as the previous policy was limited to \$50/month residential rate. This would be eliminated with adoption and true per-fixture rates would be charged starting May 1, 2018.

Councilor Baker stated when looking at residential charges, the state average is \$36.18, but Prescott Valley is \$27.77. She asked if this is because they have water and sewer combined? Is that a better way to average out the bill? Mr. Martin responded that it is hard to the compare systems, there are different costs to operate different systems. It is mostly associated with rate-base. He is hoping that Camp Verde's rate-base will grow. Scale of efficiency is higher for Camp Verde. Councilor Baker wants the citizens to understand, Council has been doing a good job to improve everything that is provided through the sewer system and they haven't raised the rates. They are trying to do this as best as they can.

Councilor Gordon stated the sewer rates are based on a "fixture basis" right now because they don't have the water company. One difference in other communities is that they charge water and sewer on a per-gallon basis. Hopefully the Town will be acquiring the water system sometime in the future to be able to reduce the rate.

Councilor Buchanan asked how many users are on the system. Mr. Martin said there are approximately 1,000 accounts. Councilor Buchanan asked how many of those aren't getting service. Mr. Martin stated there are 1,000 getting billed per month and about 140 are paying taxes but are not getting monthly bills or the benefit of the system. Councilor Buchanan asked if their rates will be increased too. Mr. Martin said they should see a benefit in their property tax bill but not too much of a change.

Mayor German stated that when he was a Council person in the past, the town subsidized the district considerably. Mr. Martin stated that in this year's budget coming forward is \$118,000 of General Fund that will go to pay that debt. Two thirds of the citizens are paying a share of that debt, because it was anticipated that would generate jobs and growth that was needed on the highway. This is a positive thing for the community.

Mr. Martin stated the Wastewater Fund is kept separately by the Town, funded separately by rates and tracked separately from the other funds, as required by law. Mr. Martin also stated it is important to note that currently no administration fee has been placed on the fund and its operational budget, which should be considered in this year's budget moving forward. This means that current items

such as, the time much of the administrative work, management (Town and Department), risk management, human resources, all finance (billing/payables, etc.) as well as other Town services do not draw from the Wastewater Fund Operations. Mr. Martin suggests this year the Council look at a more equitable solution and consider a percentage for expensing these items fairly to all residents.

Mr. Martin stated that the Town's Staff has spent a lot of time on this and is doing its best to make sure everything is fair.

### 7.1.2. Open Public Hearing

The Public Hearing was opened at 7:03 p.m.

John Teague- is a lifetime resident. He was told in the past that increases weren't going to come, that they'd actually go down. But they did increase and now the Town is requesting another increase. He is on disability unemployment, and lives on that. He stated that about 75% of the people in this town live on social security. This increase is more than what Social Security gave him this year as an increase. He will have to find a way to cover these increases and he is not sure where will he find the money to cover costs.

Timothy Wiggle- he builds homes. He knows how important it is to cover the costs of operating systems. He feels he is subsidizing the people of Camp Verde by being on the water system. He has never paid a higher sewer rate, than water rate, except in Camp Verde. The amount of water you get into home is not the amount you disperse out of your home. He can't believe that the Town can't make an agreement with the water company, that if you paid them a fee, they couldn't give you those records. If you look into the water use of homes, then you could base the sewer usage on that. Everyone in their community is paying the same amount no matter how many people live in each home. The system that needs to be looked at is rating the water use based on sewer use.

### 7.1.3. Close Public Hearing

The Public Hearing was closed at 7:08 p.m.

#### 7.1.4. Council Discussion

Town Manager Russ Martin addressed Mr. Teague. He stated that the first increase was a property tax to pay for operations. It offset the tax. There are people that go through adjustments to cover a cost that wasn't being covered or to leverage against Capital Projects that need to be accomplished. Mr. Martin suggested doing a fixture count for Mr. Teague. Mr. Teague stated his home hasn't changed since he moved in. Mr. Martin stated the Town has attempted to work with Bullard's.

Mayor German asked if there is an opportunity to look into what other treatment plants do for seniors, like a hardship waiver. Maybe have other people pay a little more to protect those seniors on a fixed budget. Mr. Martin stated that other communities like Sedona, have low-income rates that are potentially as low as half the rate, a low-flow rate. He will need more information about these plans

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and can look into this.

Councilor Jenkins likes the idea of looking into low-income options. These increases will affect more than just seniors. She would like them to look at it sooner than later. To support the citizens in those situations.

Councilor Baker stated part of approving the rate is related to the loan issue. Is it possible to do revisions right now to address a low-income rate for some users? She stated what the Town is trying to do, in all the studies that are provided, is to pay for things that the Town has no choice but to address.

Councilor Gordon asked what year the rates were last raised. Mr. Martin stated it was 2013, or about 5 years ago. Councilor Gordon said that on paper it looks like a 12% raise but it actually averages out to about 3% over the years, if it was increased over those 5 years. He stated that things need to be kept up.

Councilor Jenkins asked if the people who pay for service but don't receive service, is there a time frame or plan to get them in the system? Mr. Martin said it is not cost effective. Waste Water Treatment Plant Manager Jerry Tinagero said there are pipes that need to be installed that would be costly.

Councilor Baker asked if when that District was formed, did the original members agreed to this?

Mayor German wanted to remind everyone that in the past, there was a problem with the whole sewer system, and if the Town hadn't stepped in, ADEQ was going to put in a system no matter the cost. He commends those residents that aren't getting the service for stepping in the breach and saving the town from that standpoint.

Mr. Martin explained he would have to do a rate study to get better information. He suggested getting through the January 2020 rate increase and then reevaluate at that point. You'll be able to see two budget years and growth might affect it by then.

Councilor Gordon asked whether rates can be raised without a rate study. Mr. Martin said the Legislature requires a rate study if raising rates.

7.2. Discussion, consideration and possible approval of recommended rates from the 2018 Town of Camp Verde Wastewater Rate Study by Resolution 2018-1001, a Resolution of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Yavapai County Arizona, Adopting Fees for Town Wastewater Services for Fiscal Years 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21 & 2021-22, and superseding the Wastewater Fee portion of Resolution 2017-979. [Staff Resource: Mike Showers]

Finance Director Mike Showers wanted to make sure people don't overlook the fact that three loans would be refinanced and citizens will save money on their property taxes. The savings would not be dollar for dollar but it is a reduction.

**Motion** made by Councilor Baker to approve Resolution 2018-1001, a Resolution of the Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Camp Verde, Yavapai County Arizona, Adopting Fees for Town Wastewater Services for Fiscal Years 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21 & 2021-22, and superseding the Wastewater Fee portion of Resolution

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2017-979. Second by Councilor Gordon. **Motion** carried unanimously.

Mayor German would like Mr. Martin to look into a review of other municipalities to see if they have a hardship or low-income policy.

Mayor German recessed the meeting at 7:35 p.m.

Mayor German resumed the meeting at 7:40 p.m.

### 7.3. Discussion and possible approval of Parks & Recreation Division Facility Use & Fee Standards Policy. [Staff Resource: Michael Marshall]

Parks and Recreation Director Michael Marshall stated that this would adjust to how they would apply the fees the Council approved to Class A, B, & C. This would not apply to people who already have Facility Use Agreements. He explained there are some Class A groups/organizations that use the rooms regularly. There is a fair amount of use they aren't paying for. When they public wants to use the room for personal reasons, the room has already been booked weeks in advance. He is proposing to allow these users, on a quarterly basis, have 12 uses and or 24 hours per quarter. Basically means 2 hours a week and not pay a fee or 8 hours once a month. Any overage would be bumped up to next level (\$15 an hour). He has gotten more requests from the public to use the space. He is attempting to make it more equitable.

Occasionally they have groups who are not based in Camp Verde and have no Camp Verde connection. He suggested that if it's not benefiting Camp Verde residents, they should pay the next level up. This would adjust how to apply the fee schedule. They don't have a problem with field usage, but if they did get there, it would be similar to meeting space fee schedule. This would also not apply to AYSO, Little League, & Boy/Girl Scouts.

Councilor Gordon stated the rooms at the library are popular as well and can see overusage. He stated that as long as it's not discouraging people to use it, it's an advantage.

Councilor Baker asked when this policy would be affective. Mr. Marshall said he'd like to start July 1, 2018, at the start of the new fiscal year.

**Motion** was made by Councilor Baker to approve Parks & Recreation Division Facility Use & Fee Standards Policy as presented, effective July 1, 2018; seconded by Councilor Jenkins. The **motion** carried unanimously.

### 7.4. Discussion and possible approval of new road names for park entrance road and road to Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP). [Staff Resource: Michael Marshall]

Parks and Recreation Director Michael Marshall stated the existing road into the Waste Water Treatment Facility and new road off Hwy 260 into the Sports Complex are not named. They are suggesting naming the road going to the park be named Champion Way or an alternate of "Creosote Way". They are suggesting naming the road going to the Waste Water Treatment Plant be named "Honey Wagon Trail" or an alternate of "Wagon Boss Way".

Councilor Buchanan asked if there is any reason to make a decision tonight. Mr. Martin stated that it needs to be named before deliveries can be made there but there are a few months before that happens.

Councilor Jenkins stated she doesn't like any of the suggested names. She suggested asking the children of Camp Verde to submit names. Involve the children since the park is for the children. Mr. Martin stated that 911 limits name choices and there is the preapproved list that the County has already approved.

Councilor Buchanan said that if you give the teachers guidance, they can direct students.

Councilor Baker stated that she personally likes the names that are proposed.

Vice Mayor Murdock asked if the road that is proposed to be named "Champion Way" is a through road or emergency access only. Mr. Martin stated it is emergency access only.

Mr. Martin suggested going with the suggested Waste Water Treatment Plant name and then have the school help with the park names.

**Motion** made by Councilor Baker to approve Champion Way and Honey Trail as access road names for park entrance road and Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP). **Motion** died for lack of Second.

**Motion** made by Councilor Gordon to approve to approve Honey Wagon Trail for the Waste Water Treatment Road. **Motion** died for lack of Second.

7.5. Request for authorization for the Marshal's Office to apply for grant funding from the Governor's Office of Highway Safety (GOHS), Arizona Community Foundation (ACF), and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to pay for equipment and personnel expenses to be incurred in FY 2018-2019. [Staff Resource: Russ Martin, Brian Armstrong]

Commander Armstrong stated the Marshall's Office doesn't qualify for the Department of Homeland Security Grant so they are removing this from the list.

**Motion** made by Councilor Gordon to authorize the Marshal's Office to apply for grant funding from the Governor's Office of Highway Safety (GOHS), and Arizona Community Foundation (ACF) to pay for equipment and personnel expenses to be incurred in FY 2018-2019. Second was made by Vice Mayor Murdock. **Motion** carried unanimously

## TOWN OF CAMP VERDE-APS UTILITY EASEMENT

**TOWN OF CAMP VERDE,** a municipal corporation, (hereinafter called "Grantor"), is the owner of the following described real property located in Yavapai County, Arizona (hereinafter called "Grantor's Property"):

Grantor's Property as recorded in Book 4991, Page 950 of Official Records of the County Recorder, Yavapai County, Arizona.

Grantor, for and in consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00) and other valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, does hereby grant and convey to **ARIZONA PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY**, an Arizona corporation, (hereinafter called "Grantee"), and to its successors and assigns, a non-exclusive right, privilege, and easement, 8 feet in width or as further described in attached exhibits at locations and elevations, in, upon, over, under, through and across, a portion of Grantor's Property described as follows (herein called the "Easement Premises"):

#### SEE EXHIBIT "A" ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE A PART HEREOF

Grantee is hereby granted the right to: construct, reconstruct, replace, repair, operate and maintain electrical lines, together with appurtenant facilities and fixtures for use in connection therewith, for the transmission and distribution of electricity to, through, across, and beyond Grantor's Property; and install, operate and maintain telecommunication wires, cables, conduits, fixtures and facilities solely for Grantee's own use incidental to supplying electricity (said electrical and telecommunication lines, facilities and fixtures collectively herein called "Grantee Facilities"). Grantee shall at all times have the right of full and free ingress and egress to and along the Easement Premises for the purposes herein specified.

Grantor shall not locate, erect or construct, or permit to be located, erected or constructed, any building or other structure or drill any well within the limits of the Easement Premises. However, Grantor reserves all other rights, interests and uses of the Easement Premises that are not inconsistent with Grantee's easement rights herein conveyed and which do not interfere with or endanger any of the Grantee Facilities, including, without limitation, granting others the right to use all or portions of the Easement Premises for utility or roadway purposes and constructing improvements within the Easement Premises such as paving, sidewalks, landscaping, driveways, and curbing. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Grantor shall not have the right to lower by more than one foot or raise by more than two feet the surface grade of the Easement Premises without the prior written consent of Grantee, and in no event shall a change in the grade compromise Grantee's minimum cover requirements or interfere with Grantee's operation, maintenance or repair.

Grantee shall not have the right to use the Easement Premises to store gasoline or petroleum products, hazardous or toxic substances, or flammable materials; provided however, that this prohibition shall not apply to any material, equipment or substance contained in, or a part of, the Grantee Facilities, provided that Grantee must comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations in connection therewith. Additionally, the Easement Premises may not be used for the storage of construction-related materials or to park or store construction-related vehicles or equipment except on a temporary basis to construct, reconstruct, replace, repair, operate, or maintain the Grantee Facilities.

Grantor shall maintain clear areas that extend: 1) 2 feet from and around all edges of transformer pad, and 2) a clear operational area that extends 10 feet immediately in front of transformer, and 3) a 6 feet by 6 feet hot-stick operating area off the front left corner of transformer. No obstructions, trees, shrubs, large landscape rocks, fences, fixtures, or permanent structures shall be placed by Grantor within said clear areas; nor shall Grantor install landscape irrigation or sprinkler systems within said clear areas. Landscape irrigation or sprinkler systems installed adjacent to the clear areas shall be installed and maintained so that the transformer or any other equipment do not get wet by spray or irrigation.

Grantee shall exercise reasonable care to avoid damage to the Easement Premises and all improvements thereon and agrees that following any installation, excavation, maintenance, repair, or other work by Grantee within the Easement Premises, the affected area, including without limitation, all pavement, landscaping, cement, and other improvements permitted within the Easement Premises pursuant to this easement will be restored by Grantee to as close to original condition as is reasonably possible, at the expense of Grantee.

Grantor reserves the right to require the relocation of Grantee Facilities to a new location within Grantor's Property; provided however, that: (1) Grantor pays the entire cost of redesigning and relocating Grantee Facilities; and (2) Grantor provides Grantee with a new easement in a form and location acceptable to Grantee and at no cost to Grantee. Upon the acceptance by Grantee of a new easement and after the relocation of Grantee Facilities to the new easement area, Grantee shall abandon its rights to use the Easement Premises granted in this easement. The easement granted herein shall not be deemed abandoned except upon Grantee's execution and recording of a formal instrument abandoning the easement.

If any of Grantee's electric facilities in this easement are not being used or are determined not to be useful, Grantor may request that the facilities that are no longer needed be removed and that portion of the


easement be abandoned. Grantee will execute and record a formal instrument abandoning the easement, or a portion thereof. Any facilities that are determined to still be needed for Grantee's electrical system can be relocated pursuant to the above relocation requirements.

Grantee shall not have the right to transfer, convey or assign its interests in this easement to any individual, corporation, or other entity (other than to an affiliated entity of Grantee or an entity that acquires from Grantee substantially all of Grantee's electric distribution facilities within the area of Grantor's Property) without the prior written consent of Grantor, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Grantee shall notify Grantor of the transfer, conveyance or assignment of any rights granted herein.

The covenants and agreements herein set forth shall extend and inure in favor and to the benefit of, and shall be binding on the heirs, administrators, executors, successors in ownership and estate, assigns and lessees of Grantor and Grantee.





Dear Mr. German,

Navajo Technical University is currently asking for \$6 million in funding from the State of Arizona in order to build a Certified Environmental Lab on their campus in Chinle, Arizona. This would be the only certified lab in Northern Arizona. The lab will be used to sample air, water and soil for contaminants such as uranium. It will also be available for testing for medical treatments and research. Aside from the testing, the Lab will provide STEM education for students, especially at the higher levels. Students will be able to work in the lab alongside the scientists.

The Lab will provide jobs on the Navajo Nation and training for technicians all the way through to high level technical jobs, which will help to meet the ever growing workforce demand of companies in Arizona and those looking to locate in our state. The availability of this level of education will open a world of opportunities never before a reality for many students.

I am contacting you because although we have asked the state for \$6 million, it is unlikely that there will be that much available in the budget. We need to find sources of matching funds to convince legislators that the Lab is feasible.

Our goal is \$3 million in matching funds, and we are asking for your help to achieve this goal together. I am asking you and your organization to help us raise the funds or make a pledge for future funding. If you would be contracting for services, perhaps you could provide an estimate of what you would be likely to pay for the services that are currently sent to other labs, or projections of need for services.

It is urgent that we can show matching funds quickly because the budget negotiations have already started in the House and Senate. The goal is to have the overall budget for FY 18-19 completed by the end of March.

I have attached a position paper describing the project and the proposed budget.

I would very much appreciate your response to this request as soon as possible. Even if you are unable to commit funds at this time, it would be great if you could give the project your endorsement.

I would like to have the chance to tell you more about this project and answer any questions.

### Funding for a Certified Environmental Lab On the Chinle Campus of Navajo Technical University

#### Purpose

- Funding is requested to build a major chemistry/biology lab capable of meeting EPA standards to be located on the Chinle Campus of Navajo Technical Laboratory.
- The bill requests a one-time allocation of \$6,000,000 from the general fund.
- This money would be used for the construction of facilities and equipment for the Environmental Lab
- The Environmental Lab would serve two very important purposes:
  - o A Certified Lab to do Environmental testing and monitoring for all of northern Arizona and the State, available to NAU and other agencies and also the private sector.
  - STEM and workforce education to prepare students for high-tech and high paying jobs in the fields of environmental remediation, medical testing and research, and a future medical school on NTU in Chinle. This would be open to all students not only Navajo.
- Additional \$750,000 for ongoing operations and maintenance will come from NTU. Also Navaho Tribal Utility Authority, Salt River Project, other grants, and funding from work done for private companies and individuals will help support the Lab.

#### Impact

- · This will be the only Certified Lab in northern Arizona.
- · High paying professional and technical jobs will be created on the Navajo Reservation both for construction and the operation.
- Students will be able to learn high-tech STEM workforce skills. New avenues will be available to train for advanced careers that are out of reach right now.
- Workforce development will be one of the greatest benefits of the Lab. Students will be trained in all aspects of running the Lab, understanding and operating equipment, performing tests and compiling data. Jobs will be available on the Reservation, and trained graduates will be available to meet the critical need for highly skilled workers in STEM fields.
- Construction of the facility will generate jobs and learning opportunities for NTU
- Most of the testing that is required is extremely expensive and is currently being done in other states or outside northern Arizona. Doing testing in-house will both save money and bring money back to northern Arizona, as well as saving critical time for medical and emergency environmental situations
- . The labs that are currently available in northern Arizona do not have the capacity to measure substances at concentrations of 1 part per billion or trillion, which is necessary to detect many harmful chemicals, carcinogens, and for medical use.
- Testing will be available to Northern Arizona University, Navajo Tribal Utility Authority, medical facilities, other federal, state and county agencies and the public
- Purchase of equipment and ongoing operations and maintenance will bring money and expertise into Arizona.
- Lab will generate revenue by providing services to other agencies and the private
- Medical research will have needed tools not only to diagnose diseases, but also to have reliable data determine cause and possible cures.
